

# Why might we do this?

- We're looking for ways to release more spiritual energy for ministry.
- The meetings are struggling financially and need to combine resources.
- One meeting is very small.
- The community around us has decreased in size and no longer needs multiple Quaker meetings.
- Being online or partly online has shifted our identity as a meeting.

### How could this look?

- One meeting comes under the care of another, possibly as a worship group.
- Two or more meetings become preparative meetings under a single monthly meeting but continue to have separate worship, facilities, and legal identity.
- Two or more meetings become preparative meetings under a single monthly meeting and continue to have separate worship but share facilities and a legal identity.
- Two or more meetings combine to become a single monthly meeting, worshiping together and sharing property and a legal identity as a single unit.

Begin to draft a document: Say the idea out loud purpose, name, what happens Approve the merger to property, staff issues, etc. Square away the legal Hold threshing sessions, for **Commit to Spirit-led** both concerns and joys (what concerns and move into new discernment is possible!) facility Celebrate! ### What to watch out for

- Assuming it can't happen
- Skipping over discerning a new vision together
- Waiting too long to let distant community members know what's happening
- Inconsistency between theory and action (for example, saying that we are merging two meetings but acting as if it is one meeting coming under the care of another)
- Promises that "nothing will really change"
